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


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



Although I'm sorry to see Pete move on after a very successful 15 years at *Excellence*, his new responsibilities with PCA are an exciting step toward revitalizing the club's membership and outreach. Pete will remain in the Bay



area, where PCA will open a new West Coast office. Why is that important? For decades, many club members on the left side of the country have sensed, fairly or unfairly, that PCA remains an East-coast-oriented group; this in spite of the facts that Porsche's largest US market remains California, and that not long ago, Oregon boasted more Porsche registrations per capita than any other state. Expect to see a slow but steady rebalancing of the scale, which is already underway. Also, PCA's National Board is determined to reverse a couple of troubling long-term trends, which you may have also noted at the local level: First, the "graying" of the club's membership. I could be wrong, but I'm pretty certain that the average age of PCA members is well north of 40, if not older. PCA, and for that matter, Porsche itself, has to figure out how to bring younger people into the fold, enthusiastic people who will fill our ranks as we gray-beards eventually step aside. Second, there's the matter of retaining existing members. This is an issue we see first-hand in our own region. While our membership total has grown slowly over the years, we're also losing members. The club needs to determine why members decide not to stay with us. Reasons could range from owners selling their Porsches due to economic circumstances or a changing family—both understandable; or because the member perceives that the region or club doesn't meet his or her expectations. That's something we need to address. PCA (and thus Panorama), tends to be new-product-focused, largely because it has to maintain close ties with Porsche Cars North America, which is, after all, in the business of selling new cars. One effect of that has been the slow but steady loss of some members whose primary interest is the 356 or early 911 series. One of Pete's tasks will be devising plans to bring those former members back into the fold.

In my conversations with Pete (we chat regularly; I have been writing for him since 2003), he also promised to remake *Panorama* into a fresher and more exciting magazine, drawing on his experience at *Excellence*. Let's all wish Pete well, and support whatever initiatives he and the National board put forward. For my part, I look forward to continuing what has been a rewarding relationship with him, and working for my new editor at *Excellence*, whoever that might be.

The Redwoods, a Renault and a Premonition

t was 5 a.m. and I'm coming out of a fitful sleep plagued with indigestion from dinner the previous evening. Ann, a sound sleeper (and a better judge of road food) is awake too and says, "We need to get up and go." This is surprising since most mornings she sleeps through all manner of disturbance up to and including a morning warm-up session at the track. Feeling like I need more sleep I said, "Why? It's only five!"

Many years ago we were heading north on the return leg of an annual Christmas trip to L.A. I lay in bed still pondering any advantage of leaving early for Portland. From our



room in Eureka it's a full day's drive, especially, if you took into account that our transportation was French. We had traded in our long-suffering Chevy Monza-based Olds Starfire for a 1987 AMC Alliance. Known as a Renault R9 in Europe and re-badged in Kenosha, the Renault's ride and power characteristic were soft. A great cheap car for urban life and the most comfortable sub-compact I've ever owned; its 77 French horses were not quite up to the task of bombing up and down the coast. The 1.7 liter four coupled with its 3-speed automatic transmission and FWD would simply drone forward. After two days of this, I was anxious to get it over with. Still, it was too early for me.

Then, Ann said, "I know it's early. I don't know what it is but something's telling me we should go." So we dumped our stuff in the car and set off for Crescent City and breakfast.

The rain turned to snow as we reached the south end of the Prairie Creek Redwoods north of Orrick. We came upon a line of trucks backed up putting on their chains. The snow was only about a half-inch so I asked the driver in front of me, "What's up?" "FedEx van ran off the road up ahead. We decided to stop here but you might be okay," he said. I pulled out and passed the three semis and the still upright FedEx van and drove on. The snow was gradually getting a bit deeper but still only an inch or so. Over the first hill and a mile down the road at only 400 ft. above sea-level there were two inches of snow. I put the chains on. I thought, "It's going to be a long day."

I hate chains. The vibration they cause seems to shake a car to an untimely doom and the little Renault was no exception. After 10 miles of slogging up to 1400 ft. and then down to Klamath I was happy to see less snow and more rain. I took the chains off and thought the worst was over. *(Continued on next page)*

Making up time now (as much as I could), the snow seemed to be abating as we encountered snow patches but nothing really deep as the road hugged the coast north of Klamath. For another 10 miles or so it was smooth sailing until the road turned inland again at the Del Norte Redwoods. The rain and snow had stopped.

It seemed easy as we climbed upwards. Again we encountered snow that was about an inch deep, but the soft power through front wheel drive seemed ideal for this. Then the snow got deeper and I thought, "Let's keep going. I really don't want to put the chains back on." Besides, the snow on the Redwoods was beautiful and we'll take our time.

I've always had a warm spot in my heart for the Redwoods. Perhaps, I'm a bit of a pantheist thinking the Redwoods are nature's greatest cathedral, a safe haven where nothing but beauty exists. That vision was severely challenged when it started snowing again and I realized that I could no longer see the edge of the road, much less the centerline, just a wide white space through the trees and brush. No one had been behind us for miles and now I noticed no tracks coming in the opposite direction. We are alone. If I go off the road no one will see us! Our car is painted white! I start driving down the center of the road in apprehension ... bordering on paranoia.

It almost seemed like another world. The little was car humming along. The snow muffled all the road noise. Guided by something other than desperation, we made our way forward. Creeping along at 20 mph or so with judicious use of brake and throttle to maintain momentum to keep the speed consistent, we knew that Crescent City wasn't far away. After so many trips to L.A. over the years, we knew this part of the road well. Good thing too, as curves were ahead. The soft power hit was great for maintaining traction, but I hoped my braking was equally soft. Actually, I didn't brake much. I just let the engine do it. A series of uphill and downhill twists and turns followed. Ann and I didn't speak; we just looked at the snow as the road snaked through the trees hoping we'd be delivered from this slightly less than perfect world.

Finally, the snow stopped and the road straightened out ahead. It was all downhill to Crescent City, and on the left was the reason for no oncoming traffic. It seems an old International Harvester pick-up hauling a small travel trailer pulled onto the road, couldn't get traction, and jack-knifed. Cars were backed up all the way to town. We looked in amazement as we drove by and yet everyone else seemed to look back in disbelief.

We finally scrunched into a booth at Glen's Bakery and ordered breakfast. We told the waitress we'd just arrived from Eureka and we were hungry. She said, "How did you do that?" I said, "We left early." She said, "You're lucky. The road is closed. I guess a tree came down at the Prairie Creek Redwoods." As Ann and I looked at each other in disbelief, she said with a smile, "See. I knew we should have left early." I shook my head, looked up and thought, "Somebody must like us."

That was 25 years ago. The Renault got sold when the Paris-Rhone alternator wouldn't keep a charge on the battery. For the uninitiated, Paris-Rhone was the French answer to Lucas (La Dame du Noire?). Besides, I could no longer find oil filters.

I still love the Redwoods and always find a quiet moment when visiting to be thankful for the trees ... and our lives. To this day, when we're on a trip and Ann says, "Let's leave early." I do it without question as the words of Robert Frost come to mind.

" ... The woods are lovely, dark, and deep,

But I have promises to keep,

And miles to go before I sleep,

And miles to go before I sleep."



ORPCA, and attending our board meetings, participating and observing our board president do everything he can to keep the meeting to two hours.


