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





ORPCA Structural Reorganization



he Board of Directors has been working on a new organization struc-Lature over the last several months. A small committee consisting of Heinz Holzapfel, Carole Hedstrom, Larry Hannan and Peg Ryan worked on ideas for how to subdivide the work of running our club and presented it to the board. The new structure was approved at the April Board meeting. While this structure may morph over the next months and into next year, we feel that this is a good start. There are three new committees that will be formed and will be overseen by a Board member or Director at Large. These include the Web, Communications and Events Committees.

Following is the new structure and the descriptions of the new Committees and any new volunteer roles. Anyone interested in any of the new roles, please contact Vice President Peg Ryan at vicepresident@oregonpca.org.

WEB COMMITTEE

The Web Committee is overseen by the Director at Large - Webmaster. The committee is responsible for the web operations of the Club. This includes the web maintenance, new pages, design update and database Management. Extensive training will be provided. Here are the new volunteer roles:



NEW: Web Maintenance

- This person is responsible for the weekly / monthly / yearly maintenance of the front-end of the ORPCA website
- It is estimated that this role would take about 3 hours per week (maybe less as you get used to the tools)

Tasks include:

- Weekly: Past-Events images and link uploads
- Monthly: Anzeiger and Panorama uploads, Maintenance of online Anzeiger archive
 - Yearly: Creation of featured images for events

In order to be successful in this role a person would need:

• Basic understanding of WordPress and Elementor (Page Builder)

NEW: New Pages

- This person is responsible for adding new pages to the ORPCA website
- New Pages follow the design templates / design guidelines of the ORPCA web site
- It is estimated that this role would take about three hours per week (maybe less as you get used to the tools)

Tasks include:

- Add, review and edit event pages, verify correct settings for attendee data collection and featured images
- Add new pages for special events, notifications, updates

In order to be successful in this role a person would need:

• Basic understanding of WordPress and Elementor (Page Builder)

NEW: Design Updates

• This person is responsible for the design updates of the ORPCA website

- Competitive analysis of fellow PCA club sites
- General knowledge of new design methodologies and trends
- It is estimated that this role would take about three hours per week, however, most of the time is concentrated around the year-end web site updates (maybe less as you get used to the tools)

Tasks include:

- Develop, test and demonstrate design updates on the ORPCA development site. Design includes site Navigation, menus, page design and page template creation, effective use of media (images, video, social networking content)
- Stage deployment on the ORPCA stage site and mirror to the ORPCA production site
- Identify, integrate, test plug-ins necessary for desired site functionality

In order to be successful in this role a person would need:

 Very good understanding of WordPress, Plugins for calendar -, event -, membership -, media -, order-management

NEW: Database Management

- This person is responsible for the database management for the ORPCA website
- We maintain a membership database in WordPress, a financial transaction database in Stripe and a website performance database in WP Engine as well as multiple databases for events, forms (waivers) and products.
- It is estimated that this role would take about three hours per week (maybe less as you get used to the tools)

Tasks include:

- Weekly:
- o Monitor automatic site backups
- o Mirror complete site to staging area in alignment with "New Design" position

o Monitor from entry uploads, verify correctness and update the membership database as needed

- Monthly:
- o Upload of PCA membership database
- o Download of Stripe financial transactions database into an Excel database and correlate transactions with membership dues, event and refunds and verify correctness of data on the ORPCA member database
- o Download of website visitor data and update website visitor Excel spreadsheet
- o Generation of database exports into Excel for active members, new members, grace period members, lost members and member anniversaries
- o Upload Stripe, Visitor and Membership data to the BoD area of the ORPCA website
- o Generate the monthly webmaster report together with the other committee members and provide / present to the board
 - Yearly:
- o Setup BoD (together with "New Site" position) for the coming year and archive past years data

In order to be successful in this role a person would need to:

• Good understanding of Wordpress, import and export plug-ins, very basic php programming, good understanding of Excel (databases and formulas)

COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

The Communications Committee is overseen by the Vice President. The committee is responsible for the communications of the Club. This includes the weekly newsletter and the Anzeiger. Extensive training will be provided. Here are the new volunteer roles:

NEW: Weekly Member Newsletter

• This person is responsible for the weekly member email communications and other special announcements to the members


- The weekly email to members happens 49 weeks of the year
- There are about five special announcements each year
- It is estimated that this role would take about three to four hours per week (maybe less as you get used to the tools)

Tasks include:


- Gather information on all upcoming events. Confirm that these are happening.
- Check for PCA activities/events that would be of interest to members
- Look for other interesting Porsche events or information that could be shared with the members (even outside of our region)
- Look for other non-Porsche events to be shared with members
- Update the ad once a month based on guidance from the marketing and sales manager
- Write up the email blast and test it before sending out
- Mail out the Weekly email at 9am on Wednesday
- Update the front page of the web with the same information that is in the weekly email
- Attend monthly board meeting to help understand the events that are happening

In order to be successful in this role a person would need to:

- Understand all Oregon PCA and PCA activities that are happening
 - Attend many of the local activities
- Enjoy writing, editing and have good grammar and writing skills









NEW: Anzeiger Newsletter Editor

- This person is responsible for producing the Anzeiger newsletter content 11 months of the year
- This person is also responsible for selecting one article summary to be sent to the National newsletter, Panorama, "From the Regions Editor" each month along with a high-resolution picture
- It is estimated that this role would take about 20 hours per month

Tasks include:

- Work with club members to generate articles and high-resolution pictures from events that happen each month
 - Get new creative topics to add
- Pull pictures from SmugMug or Dropbox to add to articles
- Add pictures and captions to all pictures to be included in the articles
- Get all articles edited and ready for publication by the 25th of the month

- Send all articles and other information to Anzeiger designer
- Review versions of the Anzeiger prior to publishing for errors (TOC, missing info, incorrect links)
- Publish the Anzeiger on Mail Chimp by the fifth of the month
- Work with the Webmaster for publishing the Anzeiger picture and links onto the website

Panorama – From the Regions article includes:

• Using the recent Anzeiger as a source, provide a high-resolution picture of something special that happened recently in our club. Include a short statement about the picture and send to the "From the Regions" editor of Panorama.

In order to be successful in this role a person would need to:

- Understand all Oregon PCA and PCA activities that are happening
 - Attend many of the local activities
- Enjoy writing, editing and have good grammar and writing skills

NEW: Club Photographer

- This person is responsible for organizing photography for all ORPCA events
- This includes getting photographer(s) to attend events and collecting the photos from those people onto the club Dropbox for Photo Library Curator
- It is estimated that this role will take about one to five hours per month

EVENTS COMMITTEE

The Events Committee is overseen by the Secretary. The committee is responsible for managing the events of the club. Extensive training will be provided. Here are the new volunteer roles:

NEW: Event Administrator

 This person is responsible for working with the ORPCA Board, Program Chairs and club mem-

bers to create and maintain the list of events for the year

- This person will attend the yearly event-planning meeting and create a list of events for the following year and will keep this list up to date on a monthly basis
- This person is responsible for getting events on the web including standard events and newly scheduled events as well as PCA events (Note: Social events are handled by the Social committee). Some editing may be required of information provided by event organizers.
- This role also includes adding RSVPs or Tickets as needed and managing/reporting on those reservations
- Also included is managing the Communicable Disease waiver needed for events and reporting on this waiver to event organizers
- It is estimated that this role would take about 20 hours per month
- This person will attend the monthly Board meeting to provide updates on events as well as learn about new events being planned

Tasks include:

- Maintain an Excel spreadsheet of all events for the current year. Post an update to this form once a month to the web.
- Get events uploaded onto the web with pictures, if needed, with RSVPs or Tickets
- Manage and report to event organizers on reservations for events
- Manage and report to event organizers on the online Communicable Disease Waiver
- Assist with uploading Communicable Disease
 Waiver as needed

In order to be successful in this role a person would need to:

• Be technically competent in web activity to learn how to add events and learn how to manage the required forms for events and report on these on a weekly basis

- Understand all Oregon PCA and PCA activities that are happening and add these to the web
 - Attend many of the local activities
- Enjoy writing, editing and have good grammar and writing skills

NEW Technical Sessions Chair

- This person is responsible for organizing monthly tech sessions whether virtual or in person.
- This includes finding speakers/locations to hold these.
- Also includes working with the Event Administrator to schedule these events

In order to be successful in this role a person would need to:

- Be technically competent in automotive topics
 - Gather topics of interest from club members
- Work with Sales and Marketing to find organizations that are willing to provide Tech sessions
 - Create a yearly schedule of topics. ■



Revisited: Cost for Oregon Region Drives

neveral members recently raised concerns Decause the club is charging \$10 per car for participating in our shorter drives: Arrive and Drives, SUV Drives, and Midweek Casual Drives. While these changes were communicated in the July and August 2020 issues of Anzeiger, we want to explain again the background of the Board's decision.

In March of 2020, various government agencies issued rules and regulations that slammed the brakes on most of ORPCA's activities. The Board immediately began investigating ways that we could re-start some activities. It became obvious as the rules changed, and we could see windows of opportunity, that events as we knew them were not going to happen.

When we felt that we could safely start the driving events and meet the guidelines set by the State and the Porsche Club of America, the Board was presented with the complexity of what had to be done to make that happen and keep our members as safe as possible.

After a lengthy discussion your Board of Directors decided to impose a modest \$10.00 per car registration charge that would offset some of the additional costs of planning the drives, and updates to our system to collect the information required. We were not only concerned about additional costs but a loss in revenue due to the pandemic shutdown and the budget of the club no longer being balanced. The Board also hoped that with the registration charge and the offer to refund it if we received a cancelation in a timely manner, it would help make sure that the drives would be fully attended.

So, what changed?

• Re-plan routes and test-drive routes several times to find rest stops with open bathrooms and



safe picnic spaces, increasing the cost of event planning and testing.

- Establish a system that collected the two required waivers electronically without paper changing hands.
- Establish a pre-registration system to both control the number of people on the drives as well as collect their contact information to comply with county, state and federal tracking guidelines.
- Limited the initial drives to 12 cars in accordance with COVID guidelines (keeping group sizes under 25 total people). We later went to two groups of 12 cars leaving at different times.

What are the next steps? We expect that the current system will stay in place for the remainder of this year. For next year's budget and club operations we will re-assess and re-plan in December '21 and January '22.

As a Board, we are grateful that many of you are eager to participate again on our drives.

Many of these events currently fill very quickly. We hope to be able to add additional groups as rest areas re-open and we can gather in larger groups and we have a sufficient number of volunteers.

Please let us know what you think, alternative proposals, and any constructive thoughts.

We would love to hear from you! ■

58 Eager Contestants Experience the Technical, Fun AX #1 Course

n March 28 Oregon Region hosted 58 eager entrants at its first Autocross of the 2021 season at Portland Internal Raceway. It was a cold but dry Sunday morning. The Tech Inspection line was a bit of a challenge, but with our expert tech team we managed to get everyone through.

Due to the cooler temperatures, it was difficult to get heat into the tires; advantage dual drivers. PIR has relaxed some of the COVID guidelines, which include allowing some spectator—yet, with the weather being a bit brisk, there were not a lot of folks other than the attendees. We are back to allow-

ing loaner helmets and instructors in cars for those newbies that requested them. We even provided coffee and some individually wrapped snacks and some cookies! Yes, things at autocross are starting to feel a bit back to normal.

The top four finishers were all driving Porsches (no pesky Corvettes or Cameros!) and three of those were the ever-so-balanced Caymans! The Brothers Collection: Exceptional Cars for Everyone

Porsche 356s from the '60s flank a 1987 Porsche 959.

n case you haven't heard, there's an exceptional car mu-**L** seum in Salem, Oregon. Google "Brothers Collection muscle cars" and you'll get a gusher of YouTube hits. Muscle Car of the Week states, "The collection includes hundreds of the rarest and, arguably, the most desirable muscle cars ever assembled." The word is out.

So what is the Oregon Region Porsche Club of America doing here on a Saturday afternoon? It's not all muscle cars. The Brothers Collection also features a wide variety of significant European cars. Italian classics range from a 1959 Autobianchi Bianchina to a 1966 Bizzarini 5300 GT

Strada. There's a rare 1973 Maserati Bora, a lineup of modern Lamborghini supercars, and a handful of rare Ferraris including a 1953 250 Europa, 1959 250 GT LWB California Spider and a 1965 275 GTB/6C Long Nose Alloy.

And you'll find Porsches and other German marques: Nine 356s flank a 1987 959 with a variety of 911s from the last four decades parked close by. A silver 918 Spyder (hybrid) is plugged into an AC outlet next to a black (gas-only please) V10 Carrera GT. Three Mercedes 300SLs—two Gullwings and a Roadster—plus a 280SL Pagoda face out from one corner along with two stately cabriolets, a 1937 540K and 1969 280SE.



Once you pull yourself away from the front of the museum and head down the ramp towards the neon Rambler sign you get a feel for the grand scale of the place with hundreds of gleaming cars neatly arrayed in rows and special displays. "When we got this—it's 117,000 square feet—we didn't think we'd be able to fill it up," says museum caretaker Doug Dwyer. "You think you have plenty of room and you don't. We've all taken turns counting and we come up with a different number. But we've agreed on 355 in the museum itself with another 250 offsite."

The seeds for the museum were sown early for brothers Bart and Brad. "My father was on the road all the time when we were growing up," says Bart. "One thing we did as a family—my dad, my mom, my brother and I would go to auctions. That's kind of how we got into it," he says. "My dad died in 2007. He had

about 25 or 30 cars at that time and we decided we were going to put a museum together. We wanted to do it to raise money for charities," he says, adding, "We didn't know it was going to be of this magnitude."

That initial collection included '60s-vintage Fords, various Corvettes including an early ZR1, plus a 450SL Benz, and a '67 AC Cobra. Bart's brother Brad inherited his father's



fondness for Ford. "My brother is absolutely in love with anything Ford related!" says Bart. "And you'll find some rare Fords here that you

just don't find anywhere else."

"We have a slew of Shelby Mustangs," says Doug Dwyer. "What we have on display is like the crème de la crème. In our other building we have another six or eight of them that are gorgeous cars but they don't have the pedigree. They don't have the history." Speaking of pedigree, there's a room full of Cobras— 289s, 427s, and the one-and-only Shelby Daytona 427 Super Coupe.

The cars in the collection display a remarkable consistency of restoration. "Right now, if we can find something with less miles or better condition we're selling what we have and replacing it with something better," says Bart. "When something comes up, we go and look at it, and if it's something we're really interested in, we'll get it," he says.

Dwyer and his team endeavor to keep everything in good mechanical condition. "Everything in the museum, I've either driven or had running, or heard running, at one point or another," he says, adding, "As opportunity permits we get some of the cars out to local car shows and Cars & Coffee-type events just to get them out there and get our name known and exercise the cars a little bit."

While both Bart and Brad enjoy driving the cars in the collection,

Bart says, "I'm probably more of a driver. I like fast cars. I like the race tracks." He adds, "Most of the European stuff I like to be involved in." Still, Bart has his favorite car and it's about as American as it gets. "Everyone thinks I'm stupid for saying this. It's the 1970 Trans Am. I got it in 1983. That car's got more memories than anything else in here." When we ask him to point it out, he says, "It's actually not here. It's getting the engine overhauled at another shop right now."

The muscle car collection goes way past Fords and GM products—deep into Mopar territory. "It's really funny, neither of us really had passion for any of the Chrysler products," says Bart. "But we have more of those than anything. I think it might be because of the rarity of the Hemis."

While the muscle cars form the heart of the collection, the brothers' eclectic automotive tastes clearly extend far beyond American shores and we haven't even mentioned the motorcycles. Like any great museum, there's too much to see in

one visit. So what are the chances for a return visit?

"There's been talk—no decisions made—about being open to the walk-in public, maybe a couple of days a week," says Dwyer. "We tried to keep it under wraps for a number of years but now the word is out," he says. "We're delighted that everyone's enjoying it. You can't keep a secret like this forever." Now you know.

RICK WILSON

Growing up I was the kid watching Magnum P.I. and wanting a Ferrari or maybe a Lamborghini, definitely an Italian exotic. Fast forward to 2017 and being almost 50 years old. I was driving a Toyota highlander that I had purchased a decade and 200,000 miles ago when I told my wife it was time for me to get a new car and this time it was going to be my exotic sports car---used! I started searching high and low. Looking at all kinds of cars. Driving them too. I even went to my local Chevrolet dealer to check out a Corvette. They wouldn't even let me take a test drive in it. Then one day while in the parking lot at the

shopping center I saw a black Porsche Panamera. I went up to the owner and inquired about his car. He told me all kinds of tech specs and let me sit in the front and rear seats to experience it. I was hooked. This was the car I had to get!

Over the coming months I would scour the Internet searching for my dream car. It had to be a 4S, GTS or if I got really

lucky, a Turbo. I got a couple of these finds back east into pre-purchase inspections but each time they failed. Relentlessly I kept searching knowing that I would find the right deal. My Dad, while growing up, had instilled in me the art of the "Deal" when buying cars and I knew that if I kept searching I would find it. Then one day in January 2018 I came across an online ad for a 2010 Panamera Turbo at Rusnak Porsche down by Los Angeles. I frantically dialed, hoping beyond hope that my dream car was still available. This one only had about 50,000 miles on it and came with a Certified pre-owned warranty and it was still lower in price then all the others I had tried to purchase previously. I just knew God was looking out for me. When the salesman finally came on the line it was with the anticipation of a 19 year old virgin on his wedding night that I asked "Is it still available?" He said yes. I asked for some pictures, which he provided in about 20 minutes. That's when I made my bold move and offered him

\$40,000. He didn't laugh or make any snide remarks. He said he would discuss it with his manager and let me know. He came back a bit higher but in the end we settled on an enclosed trailer delivery to Grants Pass, my home town, for just a bit over that. He overnighted me the paperwork, which I was able to complete in about 10 minutes and then I overnighted it back to him. The whole process took less than 30 minutes. The second time I had bought a car over the Internet and the second easiest and fastest car purchase I had ever made!

Finally on February 1, 2018, the car hauler called to say he was in town and wanted to know where to

> meet me. I told him about a large parking lot at the local Abby's Pizza and he agreed to meet me there. The trailer was nothing special and the driver had to take his belt off and use the key fob to open the trunk so he could "climb" into the car to unload it. When he backed the car out I was sure there had been some



mistake. A pristine black beauty was rolling out of the trailer and it was BEAUTIFUL! It looked like a brand new car that must belong to one of the other owners he was delivering to that day. Then he came over and handed me the keys! I nearly dropped to the ground in disbelief. I was shaking with excitement as I slid into the driver's seat and started to take it all in. Somehow I had ended up buying the Batmobile! 500hp and zero to 60 in oh- my-God time! There were no "wear" marks on the seats. It had options that I didn't even know about when I bought it. It was clearly very well taken care of.

Next I sent off for my certificate of authenticity from Porsche and sent off my application to the local Porsche club. In no time at all I got the certificate back and found out that my "dream car" was born on my birthday March 11! Later I would get an invite to a Driver's skill clinic in a town only about an hour away. I of course just wouldn't pass this up. Start,

stop, skid pad and then AU-TOCROSS! I was hooked. I didn't even know something so amazing even existed. The thrill of driving my Batmobile through the cone course filled my veins with adrenaline and a rush I had never felt before. Thus my addiction began. Every month I would drive four hours to Portland to participate in the Porsche Club Autocross at Portland International Raceway.

Then about a year or so after buying my black beauty I was in the shopping center

parking lot with my wife and mother-in-law when the car seemed to be extremely low to the ground and wasn't handling properly. I pulled over to check things out and determined something was definitely wrong. I couldn't even put my foot between the car and the ground at the drivers door. I called Porsche and they arranged for a tow. That turned into a whole different story but eventually I ended up at Porsche Beaverton. Nate met me and explained that they would take good care of my car and provided a Porsche Cayenne with only about 2,000 miles on it for me to drive while I was waiting for my car to be fixed. I went back home to Grants Pass and had to wait about a month before making the return trip to Portland to pick up my car. The air suspension had sprung a leak and the compressor had given up the ghost. In the end Porsche replaced my entire suspension, which they had to order from Germany. Various other little things would crop up over the next year as well and each time Nate would take care of me and make sure I had a loaner car to get back home in.

Now, one would think my story would end here but it doesn't. While at the Porsche dealer, I ran into Will, who has a bright green GT3RS and we struck up a conversation. He invited me to join him at the Oregon Raceway Park in Grass Valley to really get out and experience what my car could do. I agreed to connect with him for one of the event weekends in the future and we each went our own way. Finally, a couple of months later I had a weekend free that matched up with an event weekend. I chased down HPDE insur-



ance and started watching YouTube videos to learn about the various flags and knowledge that drivers need when out on a track. The day finally came and I met Will at the track. He took me under his wing and we did a few laps in his car and then got into mine. He pointed out the braking and turn-in points and then left me to gather up the courage to go out and run some laps on my own. Eventually I put on my big boy pants and headed out onto the track.

I stomped on the gas and the car shot forward like a cork out of a Champagne bottle. I could feel the rumble of the motor as the car pulsed with the power of 500hp screaming to be fully loosed. Down through a dropping blind corner, brake, accelerate, brake again. It all came at me with a rhythm that I began to feel more than think about it. Through the chicane I knew I had a rise and drop, then brake, accelerate, brake into the corner. On and on it went. Flat out screaming down the straight away at over 100mph. What a rush!

I still can't believe the amazing experience I have had since buying my first Porsche. I was welcomed into a family of fellow enthusiasts. I was treated like royalty at the dealership and have made many new friends over the past three years. Even now as I write this story I am sitting in my hotel room waiting for tomorrow morning to come so I can start my third season of Autocross. You can't miss me if you show up. Just look for the Panamera with yellow stripes down the hood and yellow rims driving like a bat out of hell.

We are still dealing with Covid-19 restrictions at PIR. All participants are required to wear face coverings at all times on property.

Car classifications have been updated in order to provide a more fair, competitive experience for our participants. Highlights include a SO4L and P04L classes for the latest-generation, high-horsepower Porsches (All 718 Cayman/Boxster models (2017-current) and 992 911 base models (2019-current). Please check to make sure you're registering your car in the correct class. We will not allow participants to change classes mid-season. If a car from a different class is driven, no points will be awarded for that event.


