

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

New Summer Evening, "Birds of a Feather" Drives

ello fellow club members! If you read my January and February messages, you know by now that two of my central objectives are club drives as the backbone of the club and volunteerism that allows us to make the drives (and social activities) happen.

We continue discussions on new drive types to address the various wishes of our members. Last month I reported that we will start drives for EVs and Hybrids this year. There are two more new drive types coming.

The first new drive type is "Summer Evening Drives." These drives would start with a meet up at around 5 or 6 p.m., continue with a 60- to 90-minute drive with a lead and a sweep car, a set route, no rest stop, and end at a restaurant for a group dinner. Because of summertime and the sun not setting before 9 p.m., all the drive and the drive home will be in daylight. We believe these kinds of drives are a nice mix of driving and hanging out together after work or other activities during the day. They will allow more members that are working or busy with kids on Saturdays to attend club drives.

The second new drive type is a "Birds of a Feather" drive. They are like a standard Arrive & Drive, with a lead car, a sweep car and set driving directions, a rest stop after an hour, a length of about 100 miles and a joint lunch at the end of the drive. But they are limited to certain car types per event, or certain driving types (like leisurely driving). The car model specific drives would be like GT models only, air cooled only, convertibles only, and so on. As the lead car is of same

type as the rest of the group, the pace will be different between GT drives and air-cooled drives, yet within legal and safety boundaries. We are still discussing the name, so if you have any ideas or proposals, please send an email! These drives will allow experienced GT drivers to drive at a more inspired, yet legal and safe pace, and other groups at a pace that works better with engine characteristics or leisurely top-down cruising.

We heard from many members asking for more leisurely drives (like the current SUV drives). Both the Summer Evening Drives and Birds-of-Feathers Drives may have relaxed driving events.

Of course, these ideas and new drive types are only going to stick if members are interested and will attend. Please let us know your thoughts! Feedback early in the planning phase is most helpful. Please speak up!

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TECH TALK **Jeremy Williams**

Shine On, You Crazy Diamond!

emember when you were young, you shone like the sun ... Shine on you crazy diamond..."

These Pink Floyd lyrics describe a new component technology that Porsche debuted in 2017, which we're seeing become more and more prevalent on Porsche vehicles today. Referred to as PSCB, Porsche Surface Coated Brakes were released on the 2017 Cayenne Turbo's as a standard feature.

The PSCB's are many cuts above the standard Porsche gray-iron brakes in that they typically last about 30% longer than gray-iron, they hardly produce any brake dust, and they don't rust like grayiron. At the same time, while they're ultimately not as race-worthy as PCCB's (Porsche Ceramic Composite

Brakes), they have performance properties similar to PCCB's, and yet the PSCB's cost about 1/3 that of PCCB's. So, in many ways the PSCB's are the best of both worlds.

The special brake rotors in the PSCB setup are the first to be developed for any vehicle. Their surface is incredibly shiny, akin to a mirror-like finish which doesn't tarnish and is made of tungsten carbide which is almost as hard as a diamond. WIDIA is an acronym for wie Diamant (the German translation is "like diamond") and is the trade name for an amazingly hard material which is mainly comprised of tungsten carbide. In close collaboration with Bosch/Buderus, what Porsche developed using this technology as a guide, is quite astonishing.

A brake rotor made 100% of tungsten carbide would cost about 3x that of PCCB's (which are silly expensive already), so Porsche had to get very creative with the construction of the PSCB rotors; a process that took ages to develop. They start with a gray-iron rotor which is lasered to give structure, then an interlayer of nickel helps bind the gray-iron and tungsten carbide, where the tungsten carbide particles are flame-sprayed onto the rotor at supersonic speeds. This results in a tungsten carbide coating which is about 100 micrometers thick. However, once the rotors were finally created, Porsche wasn't done. Very special brake pads were also needed to complete the PSCB setup.

Since the brake rotor surface is so smooth, the brake pad compound needed to be engineered with very hard microscopic particles that would anchor in to the also-very hard tungsten carbide rotor coating. One would expect that such a unique brake pad would still produce considerable brake dust as it digs and bites into the brake rotor, however PSCB pads create an astonishing 90% less brake dust than grayiron pads do. As well, the mirror-like rotor surface which has no grainy structure like a grey-iron rotor, actually allows for complete pad-rotor contact, which means the entire surface area of the rotor can be used for fully optimal braking performance. When the PSCB components get hot from repeated braking exercises, they don't show signs of brake fade like standard gray-iron components. This places the performance output of PSCB's close to that of PCCB's, but remember that the PSCB's are about 1/3 the price of PCCB's.

Due to the gigantic reduction in brake dust from the PSCB technology, Porsche cleverly decided to market PSCB applications via a unique color for the 10-piston front calipers and 4-piston rear calipers. While "Big Red" brake calipers have previously signified Porsche's best brakes, along came yellow calipers to signify the race-worthy PCCB's. Now, white calipers signify PSCB's. White brake calipers you ask?! Yes, what better way to communicate that the PSCB's


produce such little brake dust and therefore the calipers stay super clean!

So with PCCB-like performance for significantly less money, and major improvements over standard gray-iron brakes, what are the downsides to PSCB's? The only one I've been able to come up with is regarding those who want to participate in more off-pavement driving with their Cayenne, yet keep in mind that this sticking point isn't specific to only PSCB's. As vehicles continue to grow in both size and performance output, larger and larger brake components are needed to help quickly slow these vehicles down. I'm all for the highest margin of safety and performance, so bigger brakes vs smaller brakes are definitely an attribute. However, in order to clear these huge brakes, a large wheel is needed (21"-22" diameter wheels are the norm now), which means the profile/aspect ratio of the tire is thinner. What does this mean if you're wanting to take your strong, durable, and more than capable Cayenne off-pavement for everything from reaching a favorite hiking trailhead to more serious overlanding? Thinner profile tires mean more possibility for wheel damage and tire punctures, a rougher ride, and less grip on uneven terrain. And since the brakes are so massive in diameter, you cannot easily reduce wheel diameter in order to inversely increase the tire's sidewall height, you're pretty much stuck with more fragile tires for off-pavement adventures. A possible solution? Hop in an older '05-16 955/957/early958-generation Cayenne with its 18" or 19" wheels and taller tires, as this will also help you appreciate the numerous refinements of your '17-18 late 958generation or '19+ 9Y0/9Y3-generation Cayenne that much more!

My Father's Pics, Part 3 of 3: **Brynfan Tyddyn**

y father began his sports car adventures in 1955 with the purchase of an MG. He attended local races when he could and in particular snapped photos of a full weekend of events near Wilkes-Barre PA. They were the Giant's Despair Hillclimb (covered previously) and the Brynfan Tyddyn road races.

Brynfan Tyddyn? You gotta be kiddin'. What kind of name is that? In Welsh it means 'Hilltop Farm' and was made up of public roads around a state senator's property near Harvey Lake. Located just across the Susquehanna River from Giant's Despair in Pennsylvania, the SCCA ran races there from 1952 to '56. In 1955 you might have heard of Bridgehampton, or Thompson or other tracks. Watkins Glen was just finished and Lime Rock was still a year away from completion.

At 3.5 miles with about 15 turns and barely two lanes of lousy asphalt, this was US road racing in its infancy. This meeting was restricted to cars with less than twoliter engines. Nevertheless, even the smallest cars at 750 cc or less were incredibly quick around this tight little 'country lane' course.

Safety, such as it was then, was haybales, virtually no runoff room, non-existent roll bars, and because you were behind a snow fence; it had to be a safe place. Right?


Before we go, let's have a good breakfast. Is that bacon I smell, or Castrol?





When 550-03 was finished with the '54 Carrera Panamericana, Hushke von Hanstein ordered its four-cam motor replaced with a 1500 pushrod motor. Via Max Hoffman, the car was entered at Sebring in '55 with Evans Hunt as one of the drivers. Finishing 48th overall the car then went to Johnny von Neumann for a few races and then back to Hunt who raced it here. Well worn, the car gave up the ghost and Otto Linton's famous OSCA won. After many years and owners the car was restored to its original Mexican race appearance under the ownership of Jerry Seinfeld.

In 1957, my father would meet my mother through a mutual car nut. During their courtship, he made a short return trip to White Sands and a reconnaissance of L.A. in a Jaguar XK140. The Jag was equipped with driving lights for those long drives across the desert ... and the country for that matter. Many letters later they were married and in 1959 we moved to L.A.

These photos (slides) along with others sat in a box for 47 years when my mother passed away 16 years ago. They've been returned to my father.—KEEP SPINNEN 🗖


ateline: 1978 First come the kids, then come the cars!

Every month, we receive many great Porsche photos ... and we need more for both event stories and covers!

EVENT PHOTOS

- Photos can be vertical or horizontal ... a variety is great!
- When shooting, there should be a comfortable margin around all edges of the focal point (most often, a car). Do **NOT crop!** We will crop your photo to the best proportion for the page. Photos with the edge of a car clipped off is the most common photo error.


COVER PHOTOS

- The cover "bleeds" off the edges, so please leave a good margin on every side of the focal point (most often, a car)
- Make sure there is nothing significant in the masthead area (see diagram at right).

ALL PHOTOS

• Shoot and send the highest resolution possible.



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Gear Up for the 2022 ORPCA Autocross Season!

utocross Season! Autocross (also called "Solo") is a driving event where a driver $oldsymbol{oldsymbol{L}}$ negotiates a closed course of cones one car at a time to achieve the fastest possible time. It is a form of motorsports that emphasizes competition and learning car control at safe speeds. Autocross is an exhilarating and fun way to help raise the level of your driving skills to match the capabilities of your Porsche! We strive to cultivate an air of camaraderie and fun among our participants. No previous experience is necessary and novices are welcome. All you need is a driver's license, an automotive helmet (2015 or newer SA or M Snell rated) and a car that can pass a basic mechanical safety inspection. There are loaner helmets available and instructors should be available. Cars are run in classes against cars with similar performance. Bring any older or newer Porsche, including 911s, Boxsters, Caymans, Macans, Panameras, Cayennes or Taycans. For more information, please visit our website: https:// www.oregonpca.org/home/autocross/

Car classifications remain similar to 2021 with the new SO4L and PO4L classes for the latest-generation, high-horsepower Porsches (All 718 Cayman/ Boxster models (2017-current) and 992 911 base models (2019-current). Please check to make sure you're registering your car in the correct class. We will not allow participants to change classes midseason. If a car from a different class is driven, no points will be awarded for that event. Similar to past years, we will be limiting the number of cars for each event. This allows for a better participant experience and ensures we're able to efficiently

manage the run groups. Please register early if you are interested in participating. Walk-ins will not be accepted and people on the wait-list will be added in order (priority to members) if there are cancellations. Work assignments are mandatory and will be enforced. It takes volunteers to keep this thing going. If you drive, you work ... no exceptions. We realize some folks have special circumstances that may prevent them from working in specific roles. We'll do our best to accommodate you, but we ask that you consider whether the physical aspects of autocrossing are appropriate given your individual health.
