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


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ZONE 6 UPDATE John P Sommerwerck, Zone 6 Representative


UPCOMING TREFFENS:

Master of One's Own Stuff

"Under a spreading chestnut-tree The village smithy stands; The smith, a mighty man is he, With large and sinewy hands, ..."

—'The Village Blacksmith' by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

t's that time of year when some of us turn from driving to working on our cars. In some ways it's more rewarding. What is it about working with our hands?

I'm probably one of the world's laziest people and yet I enjoy seeing the result of something I've created or repaired by myself. To that point, I recently had a front turn-signal bulb go out on my 2003 Boxster.

Admittedly, signal bulbs rank pretty low (make that very low) on the scale of jobs some of our members do; especially the air-cooled devotees. Given the Boxster's mid-engine configuration and not having a lift, I confine myself to the more mundane aspects (things you can see which are generally easier to work on). And so, I turned towards the removal of the "fried egg" headlight assembly wherein said turn signal bulb resides.

Per the owner's manual, locating the simple twist-turn plastic carpet retainer inside the trunk or "frunk", one is faced with the challenge of removal. Unlike the plugs that hold the battery cover on which require a 90 degree turn to pop out, for variety, Porsche has deemed this one to be unscrewed to release the carpeting. Naturally, someone had screwed it on half way. So, unknowingly at first, you are stumped as to which way. Remember, "Righty Tighty. Lefty Loosey."

After pulling back the carpeting pinched under the weather stripping and applying considerably more force than might seem necessary, a rubber plug is revealed. Behind this is the headlight locking mechanism. Videos show men pulling this plug out with their bare hands. Of course my plug is different! After a while with a dull screwdriver, I was beginning to think

it was made of old Firestone crossply with a rating of 6.5 on the Mohs Hardness Scale.

Finally lifting the edge, the plug yielded; again requiring more force than it might seem. In fact, that plug is 20 years old.

Next up was finding the special socket wrench in the dark bowels of the tool kit behind the spare tire. This is more easily done with a shop light hanging from the hood latch above provided you don't hit your head on it whilst returning to a standing position. Then, according to the manual, insert the wrench into the opening until seated on the hidden unlocking spindle. (We're going blind, Captain!) Use the shop light.

At this point we are ready for the big thrill as turning the wrench 'Lefty' 180 degrees allows the headlight to almost leap out of the body (these Litronic units are \$1000+ plus from Porsche). The unit is very light for its size but before you think about encircling the front of the car with pillows, blankets, and the dog's bed, know that the wiring reins it in. No worries. Just be sure to cover the surrounding bodywork with blue tape so as not to scratch it accidentally.

Next, compress the uncompressible locking tabs and disconnect the electrical connector which again requires more force than it might seem. Move to the work bench. The bayonet-style turn signal bulb change turns out to be a snap, figuratively. Then, as is so often quoted, "Reassemble in the reverse order." It was a piece of cake, right? It will

be the second time. You might as well do both headlights. The rear signal bulbs are much, much easier. Victory achieved!!

These seemingly simple tasks require more thought than you might assume (the first time). They require a degree of engagement possibly not found in day-to-day at work. Years ago I lost more sleep over figuring out how to install the twist-lock barrels which secure the Boxster's hardtop as opposed to drawing up a support plan for a business unit at work. Clearly, my values were misplaced for some time.


A couple of years ago a friend of mine sent me the book Shop Class as Soulcraft: an inquiry into the value of work by Mathew B. Crawford. In it, Crawford reveals the contrast between what are considered 'desirable' jobs and the trades. And how, after achieving a PhD. and working for a 'think tank' he quit and opened a motorcycle repair shop. After reading, I understood what is so satisfying about working with your hands.

In this world of ever-increasing technology, convenience, and autonomy you can find a kind of agency. To be, as one chapter says, '... Master of One's Own Stuff.' Why else do we look at craftsmen, mechanics, plumbers, and even linemen with a kind of envy?

More than that, think how education systems substituted computer classes for shop classes with

the idea that we were all going to float away on a wave of technology.

To get a better idea of Crawford's thoughts you can view a short 20 minute video here.

One of many ideas Crawford is a proponent of is mentorship programs. He feels that while the skills taught will have an immediate use; the experience gives way to broader intellectual and moral development. Just think about the times when a friend (mentor) has helped you learn something new. As a bonus, you might possibly have had a conversation that was off-topic but equally stimulating.

In this regard, we should be proud of ORPCA's scholarship program for three local community colleges to advance students in their automotive programs. In 2016 under the leadership of past presidents Joe McQueen, Eric Underwood, Larry Hannan, some of our club sponsors, and Gary Koppang, the scholarships were created as a consistent way of giving back to the community. Electronic Engine Oil Dipsticks: Friend or Foe?

tarting around 2005 or so, a majority of European vehicles including Porsches, were engineered to NOT have a mechanical engine oil dipstick which could easily be pulled out of the oil sump to check the engine oil level. Instead, the "old trusty" dipstick was replaced with an electronic level sensor and digital readout in the instrument cluster (gauge to the right of the center tachometer). While there is much debate as to why this change occurred (ease of packaging/ manufacturing and thus cost savings for Porsche, better integration into vehicle electronics and more Porsche safeguards for warranty claims involving low oil level, supposed convenience, funneling frustrated owners into dealerships/service centers, etc.), what isn't as debatable are some of the misunderstandings and frustrations with an electronic sensor readout.

Let's start with checking the engine oil level after a fresh oil/filter change. With the previous mechanical dipstick, anyone could easily check and physically see the oil level on the dipstick minutes after

letting the fresh oil settle into the oil sump. Even after a short test drive, and then letting the oil settle once again, the level could be quickly checked a second time and the vehicle is ready to go. With the electronic dipstick, the vehicle needs to be driven with fresh oil for the oil level to populate on the gauge. This can take up to 30 – 40 minutes. Unfortunately, sometimes it takes this long, which is partly why oil changes have continued to increase in price, beyond the increasing labor time required to remove/re-install the myriad of panels to access components, as well as the ever-increasing synthetic oil and OEM oil filter costs. (Note; e-Hybrids are even more challenging and time-consuming to populate oil level as more often than not, the battery pack is powering the vehicle vs. the engine, so the engine is stone cold when it comes in for an oil change, and thus we have to get the engine warmed up to be able to begin the oil change process).

Some of you may be asking why the gauge readout is important as long as the engine is filled with the proper specified

quantity of oil. Since our clients want to see the gauge readout themselves so they know everything is good to go, we need to ensure that the readout is providing accurate information to them. While some Porsche models allow our technicians to view the oil level with the computer scan tool, the vehicle still needs to be driven before the oil level will be populated in the gauge for the client to see.

When driving after the oil change, the oil level gauge readout will show "Oil level information currently unavailable" as the vehicle has determined that the oil isn't yet up to temp and therefore the system can't accurately gauge the oil level.



Once the Porsche has been driven enough for the oil level readout to populate, a flaw in the engineering is that when more might need to be added to the engine. If you want to watch a live change in the oil level on the gauge as oil is added, as soon as the hood/rear decklid is opened to add more oil, the level readout disappears (an open hood/decklid icon is now

visible instead). You cannot see the level readout again until you drive a second time to re-populate the level readout. Not convenient in the least.

Some of you may also be asking "What if I'm driving around while waiting for the electronic readout to populate and I have too little or too much engine oil, how will I know?" Yes, this is a potential issue since there is no mechanical dipstick to initially check your "baseline" oil level, and unfortunately, you won't know whether the engine is under-filled or over-filled for possibly 40+ minutes. We know it is scary. This is why it's crucial to make sure as much oil is initially drained out as possible while the engine is at least warm, and then filling with the specific quantity and proper oil spec (specs are continuing to evolve; currently there are at least 5 different possible engine oils for Porsches). At our three shop locations, our techs will initially fill with just under the specific quantity, then drive for the oil level to populate, re-check what this specific vehicle's gauge is communicating to us/client, and then we'll top off oil as needed, aiming for the final level (green vertical "bar") to rest in the middle of Max and Min, like this:



The reason we aim for this level is that we've found that the electronic level sensors vary in accuracy from car to car, and we don't want to end up with the gauge showing a final level at Max like this:



The reason we don't want to end up with the oil level at Max is that even though the message says "Oil level is correct," as the car is driven even more, the oil gets even hotter/thins out/ level rises further and then an overfilled "Above Max" warning can display as seen below, which then requires oil to be drained out of the oil sump, creating inconvenience for everyone:



On the other end of the spectrum, below is a picture of the cryptic and difficult to understand underfilled message, which is trying to

communicate that while it's possible to keep driving the vehicle for some time, it wants a maximum of 1 quart of oil to be added ASAP as the level is currently at minimum. Note; remember that just like with the old trusty mechanical dipstick, the volume between Min and Max lines is 1 quart worth. Min causes confusion for some drivers, as Min doesn't mean that the engine doesn't have very much oil in it, for even at Min most Porsche engines still have 6+ quarts in the oil sump:



All in all, we're personally not fans of vehicle manufacturers moving from mechanical dipsticks to ONLY electronic dipstick readouts. We feel the old trusty mechanical dipsticks should have been retained as a secondary tool when the electronic dipstick was implemented, for the mechanical dipstick is a more reliable and quicker method of physically checking oil levels. Yes, the electronic dipstick in the gauge cluster is a convenient way to view oil level without getting out of the vehicle, but solely relying on an electronic sensor which can possibly read less-thanaccurately, and is also SO much more time consuming for everyone to deal with, is a disservice to the vehicle and driver.

another puzzler to chew on; while the newer Porsche Cayenne's don't have mechanical dipsticks, their siblings the Audi Q7 and VW Touareg still do. Hmmm...

s you read this month's Anzeiger, our 2023 Tour season is nearly over. Tours are a big part of our region's activities. We ran 57 separate tours, with many multi-day events totaling 66 days of memories with old and new friends. Besides our standard Arrive and Drives, Midweek Drives, and SUV Drives, we added many specialty events. These drives included



We soon reached our lunch destination, the




In Memoriam

In a nutshell, these early cars lack a filter screen for their folding top and roof drains, and if those drains become clogged with debris, water can back up and flood the area beneath the seats - right where the car's critical immobilizer unit lives. Read the story and find out what happens next - and how to deal with this potentially very costly issue.

HOW TO FIND THE UPLOAD LINK TO SHARE YOUR PHOTOS

A big thank you goes out to those who volunteer to take photos and then upload them for us to use. There is no greater feeling for a photographer than to see their work published. We get thousands of photos each year; perhaps one of yours will appear in the Anzeiger or in our yearly calendar.

In general, the process for uploading images needs to start on our Smug Mug page where you will find the upload link to Dropbox for each event.

- 1. Once the photographs are uploaded to Dropbox, I will be notified.
- 2. The photographs will be edited and uploaded to the appropriate SmugMug Folder.

Here is a step-by-step guide to upload your photographs from an **ORPCA** event:

- 1. Go to our photo website: SmugMug Oregon PCA https:// orpca-pix.smugmug.com
- 2. Scroll to the Photographer's Calendar on the right.
- 3. Choose the date of the event and open the link. There may be more than one event per date, so pick correctly by clicking on the options and checking the name of the event.
- 4. Click on the link in the Description field. This will take you to the DropBox folder for that event.
- 5. Drag and drop your photos into that folder.

In summary, each event for the year has a DropBox upload link. Please use it. Each link can be found in the Photographer's Calendar embedded in our SmugMug site. If you have questions, please contact Rick: clubphotographer@oregonpca.org You can also text me at 503-871-3718. If the answer is easy, I will text back. If not, I will call you back.
