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

Lined up at the top.

ne of my Cayman's favorite roads is the Old McKenzie Highway between Belknap Hot Springs and Sisters. But it seems we just start to get into the rhythm of the curves when we get caught behind a Winnebago. Or if not that, there are bicyclists or deer to contend with, or oncoming pickup trucks taking their half of the road out of the middle. I've often wished I could have the whole road to myself.

Back to the Future: A Recent Porsche 356 Drive

purchased my 356 over a year and a half ago. It's a 1965 Ruby L red 356C. My intent was to own a great driver quality 356 that I could tour around the States, but what I purchased did not qualify as great driver. I used it on local "buddy drive" day trips, taking notes on issues to address. I acquired several 356 catalogs, ioined the Northwest 356 club and the 356 Registry and talked with owners whenever the chance arose. Last winter Wes Andrews rebuilt the "bigbore" engine, converted the electrics to 12V, and installed a full flow oil filtration system. Wes cautioned me, as good friends do, about the idea

of cross-country drives in technology as old as in a 356. Stories of broken cranks, cracked heads, valve-train issues and endless other failures were told. I listened but I knew that I was going to take "long haul" trips regardless of his advice. After driving it around home locally for about 1,750 miles it was time for an extended shakedown cruise.

I was registered in the annual North Meets South 356 gathering that was being held in Cambria, California so it became the focal point of my desire to test the car. After an oil/filter change and a valve adjustment the car was loaded with tools, spare parts





(some of which I had no idea of how to install), extra oil, clothes, paper maps, measuring equipment, and lots of tablets for taking notes. Ruby rolled down our driveway at noon on a nice Monday morning. The overall route was to take I-5 to Grants Pass, then over to Crescent City, down the California coast to the Bay Area, inland to avoid San Francisco traffic and tolls, down to Los Banos and finally back to the coast to take Highway 1 to Cambria.

Despite the horror stories, I made it to Crescent City on the first day. Yes indeed, 354 miles without a broken crank, cracked heads, and the Weber carbs didn't burst into flames! On day two, I spent lots of time driving through the Redwoods. No traffic, beautiful weather and stunning scenery. The experience was almost magical. At each fuel stop I checked

the oil temperature with a hand thermometer, checked oil level, calculated MPG, and cleaned the windows. Each morning I checked tire pressure and rechecked oil level. As the miles rolled by, I felt more comfortable with the car, prayed a bit less, and even took the risk of texting Wes with photos of my progress. The total distance covered was 2015 miles. The average gas mileage was 29.5 MPG. No oil was added.

I enjoyed the drive immensely. Every gas station or rest stop provide enthusiastic conversations with other travelers. I was given a salute or a "thumbs up" by motorcyclists, sports car drivers, and even by the California Highway Patrol! On the negative side I quickly learned how big 18-wheelers appear when they are next to the 356. Would I do it again? You bet. ■







The North Meets South 356 Event: Perfect Venue for a Newbie

n the story on the previous pages, I wrote about my drive from Portland to Cambria California and how much fun it was. The purpose of my drive was to attend the "North Meets South" (NMS) annual 356 gathering. The entire event is focused on the Porsche 356 and this year it was attend by over 150 people and around 130 cars. Participants enjoyed drives, tech sessions, a concours, and evening socials. I met Joe Angel from our ORPCA club and we enjoyed attending specific events together. I hoped to meet up with Dave and Becky Schroeder, but they were "captured" by racing buddies in Monterey California as the Laguna

Seca track was hosting historic races.

Every NMS participant that I met was full of 356 knowledge and happy to share it. Almost all conversations were based on technical points of interest. The level of enthusiasm expressed by both men and women was truly exceptional. The passion for the Porsche 356 was shown in every smile, every hand shake and every conversation. I can't think of a better venue for a 356 newbie like me.

In the tech session on 356 values and sales, owners of European Collectible and Auto-Kennel expressed optimism on growing values, based on a broad age base of those desiring a 356. In the last five years the









typical person looking for a 356 was between 55 and 75 years old. Now resellers and auction houses are getting inquiries from a much younger age group, even down to those in their thirties. The younger group wants to "buy into" the experience of owning and driving a 356. However it was noted that group lacks experience in the need for periodic maintenance, frequent oil checks, where to get service, and in some cases how to drive a manual transmission.

In the tech session on maintenance. John Willhoit, Jack Staggs, and Ed Rutherford gave a brief description of services that they provide and answered questions from attendees.

Take-a-ways included: dual master brake cylinders were highly recommended by all, as well as full flow oil filtration systems. Sticking to periodic maintenance was a must and it should include suspension as well as engine service. They also agreed that getting parts was not a big difficulty, but finding good labor was a problem. The cost of maintaining a 356 is going up, but so is their value.

Next year's North Meets South event will be held in San Louis Obispo at the end of April. My plans are to be there to meet newly made friends and to continue the learning process.



utocross Season! Autocross (also called "Solo") is a driving event where a driver $oldsymbol{\perp}$ negotiates a closed course of cones one car at a time to achieve the fastest possible time. It is a form of motorsports that emphasizes competition and learning car control at safe speeds. Autocross is an exhilarating and fun way to help raise the level of your driving skills to match the capabilities of your Porsche! We strive to cultivate an air of camaraderie and fun among our participants. No previous experience is necessary and novices are welcome. All you need is a driver's license, an automotive helmet (2015 or newer SA or M Snell rated) and a car that can pass a basic mechanical safety inspection. There are loaner helmets available and instructors should be available. Cars are run in classes against cars with similar performance.

Bring any older or newer Porsche, including 911s, Boxsters, Caymans, Macans, Panameras, Cayennes or Taycans. For more information please visit our website www.oregonpca.org/activities/autocross/

CHANGES/UPDATES FOR THIS YEAR INCLUDE:

We are still dealing with Covid-19 restrictions at PIR. All participants are required to wear face coverings at all times on property.

Car classifications have been updated in order to provide a more fair, competitive experience for our participants. Highlights include a SO4L and P04L classes for the latest-generation, high-horsepower Porsches (All 718 Cayman/Boxster models (2017-current) and 992 911 base models (2019-current). Please check to make sure you're registering your car in the correct class. We will not allow participants to change classes mid-season. If a car from a different class is driven, no points will be awarded for that event.





The Zenith carburetors were also rebuilt and re-jetted to conform with "E" specifications. The motor rebuild included upgraded heat exchangers, Bursch exhaust, and chain tensioner. Additional work performed during my ownership includes the addition of an MSD ignition, replacing shocks, brakes, axel assembly, half shafts, torsion bar and bushings, linkage, and rod bushings, fuel pump and oil cooler, clutch and flywheel. A recent service included new batteries, rotor and plugs. The 2.2L flat-six originally came with a Sportomatic transmission. This was subsequently replaced with a five-speed manual 901 transaxle by a previous owner, re-built in 2005. The interior is original and trimmed in black leatherette from the factory. Seats have been upgraded with period correct sport seats from GTS Classics in leatherette basketweave. Seatbelts with shoulder straps have been upgraded as well, and charcoal carpeting is retained throughout. Asking \$70,500. loujaffepdx@gmail.com (5/21)
