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

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

Club Announces New **Guidelines for Events**

have a couple of messages for everyone this month.

My first message is that we are starting to loosen up on the COVID-19 rules for our drives and tours. The board has approved the following changes for drives/tours:

- The Release and Waiver of Liability will be available to be signed at the start.
- As long as attendees are vaccinated, face coverings are no longer required outside of the car. Social distancing is not required.
- At the end of the drive, there may be an option for indoor food, outdoor food, or an outdoor area for a picnic. If outdoors, attendees will be notified to bring their own chairs and food. (If we go to a restaurant, we will have to follow the rules of that establishment.)

These rules still apply:

Attendees must register ahead of time and complete the Communicable Disease and Release ahead of time and the cost is still \$10.00/car. Print out the directions at home and bring to the start of the drive.

We have had a couple of drives where we took off our masks. It was wonderful to see faces and smiles.

My second comment continues the volunteering message from last month. Our Autocross and Socials are well supported with volunteers. We have volunteer organizers for our drives and tours this year. Members are volunteering to write articles on events and take pictures for us. We thank everyone in those areas for their time and energy.

We will need help in these other areas:

Web: Maintenance, Web Pages, Design Updates, Database Management

Communications: Weekly Member Newsletter, Anzeiger Newsletter Editor

Events: Event Administrator, Technical Sessions Chair

Hanks's character, Jimmy Dugan, says to Dottie "Baseball is what gets inside you, it's what lights you up, you can't deny that!" This is what makes our brand unique, we love Porsches, we love to talk about them, we love to drive them. 
down to appreciate the encounter with wildlife.



Many of the town's residents were eating there as well, and our friendly waitress told us she had worked there for over 20 years. Following lunch, we drove another 87 miles through amazing countryside, crossing into Oregon at Umatilla and pausing at Hat Rock State Park near Hermiston. Hat Rock is a formation of exposed basalt that rises approximately 70 feet to a plateau. Hat Rock is a site on the Lewis and Clark historic trail, for on October 19, 1805, as the expedition canoed down the Columbia River, Clark noted "a rock on the Land." There, we took a rest stop where Randy and his wife, Diane, provided snacks and bottles of water. Driving then continued for another 107 miles through eastern Oregon and back into Washington to our first winery stop, Long Shad-



ows, in Walla Walla.

Long Shadows Winery was the vision of Allen Shoup, who had previously spent 20 years building Chateau Ste. Michelle and wanted to create a group of ultra-premium wines. Allen hired Gilles Nicault as director of winemaking, and he has recruited collaborating winemakers from around the world. Within four years of its inception, Food and

Wine Magazine named Long Shadows Winery "Winery of the Year" in 2007. Since then, Long Shadows has continued to produce highly sought after and highly acclaimed examples of the best wines Washington can produce. Their tasting room is decorated with many beautiful works of Chihuly glass. Following our wine tasting and the accompanying hors d'oeuvres, we returned to



Walla Walla to our respective hotels and dinner on our own.

On our second day we met in the parking lot of the Marcus Whitman Hotel at 9:00 a.m. and proceeded to drive through Harsha, Washington. After 46 enjoyable and spirited miles we stopped at Lyons Ferry State Park. The Park bears the name of the Snake River ferry service which ran from 1860 to 1968, when it was replaced with the Snake River Bridge. This public park is a recre-

ation area located near the confluence of the Snake and Palouse rivers which offers facilities for boating, fishing, and swimming. The remarkable landscape reveals canyon walls carved by the Ice Age Floods over fifteen million years ago. This location was the home of the Palouse Indian tribe, and was visited by Lewis and Clark on their westward journey in October 1805.

The second driving leg involved a 61 mile drive to Rasa Vineyards Winery located in Walla Walla, Washington. Founded in 2007 by Billo and his brother Pinto Naranave, the winery produces ultra-premium, terroir-specific wines. Billo Naravane has a background in

science, with a bachelor's degree from MIT and a master's degree from Stanford, he studied viticulture and enology at UC Davis. He is now one of the few Masters of Wine (MW) in the world. His new lineup of wines is truly one of the best in the state from crisp Rieslings to inky Syrahs. Tasting was accompanied by sandwiches provided by the Walla Walla Bread Company.

The third leg of the day was a 30 mile drive through rolling hills to L'Ecole No. 41 and Woodward Canyon wineries. The two wineries' tasting rooms are just a short walk from

each other, so we divided into two groups and switched tasting rooms allowing for about an hour at each venue. L'Ecole No. 41 is a thirdgeneration family-owned winery in an old schoolhouse that produces classic examples of the unique terrior of their Walla Walla vineyards as well as the prime fruit sourced from sub-appellations within the Columbia Valley. Established in 1983, it was the third winery in Walla Walla and the 20th in the state. L'Ecole No. 41 has received a multitude of national and international accolades and is now one of the most "prominent and visible Walla Walla wineries."

Woodward Canyon Winery was established in 1981 by Rick Small and Darcey Fugman-Small and it was the second winery in the Walla Walla Valley. Rick planted the first 41 acres of the Estate Vineyard in 1976 on his family's dryland wheat ranch. The winery also purchases grapes from selected growers in the Horse Heaven Hills. They currently make some of the prized Cabernets and Chardonnays in Washington as well as produce a second label, Nelms Road, which offers delicious





and affordable Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon red wines.

After leaving the L'Ecole No. 41 and Woodward Canyon wineries, we drove 13 miles back to downtown Walla Walla. We had around an hour and a half to freshen up before we all gathered at Hattaway's on Alder for a great dinner. Not only did I get to know some people better, but I made great new friends of this wonderful trip. All too soon it was time to say our goodbyes. Most everyone spent the night in Wala Walla, and the next day went our separate ways back home. I know everyone had a terrific time on this excursion and hopefully our Porsche Club will make this an annual event. If so, I encourage everyone to go and enjoy exquisite wines and



make both new and better friends in our club.

ORPCA Scholarships and Grants Encourage Excellence in Future Porsche Technicians

ne of the lesser-known missions of the Oregon Region PCA is to provide a "community service" function.

HISTORY

In 2015 Joe McQueen was president. He recommended that the Club take on a long-term project. As it happens Joe's wife, Ginny, is a member of American Association of University Women. The AAUW annually hands out a scholarship to a deserving student. (As an aside, my wife, Theresa, was able to get her Master's degree with the aid of a scholarship from AAUW...) Joe saw this as an opportunity to meet a long-term need that we, as car owners, had for skilled technicians to care for our cars.

SCHOLARSHIPS

The Scholarships & Grants Committee held its first meeting in April 2015 at the behest of Joe McQueen.

There are seven members participating. The group discussed the concept of offering scholarships to students enrolled at the community college level. The Committee decided that the best option for the Club is to provide funding for an annual scholarship of \$1,500 to one Automotive Service Technology student at each of three metro-area schools, those being Clackamas, Mt. Hood and Portland community colleges. The scholarship amount helps defray, but does not entirely cover the quarterly cost of tuition. The strategic goal is to develop the Porsche service technicians of the future.

By giving the money to the college foundations, and having them make the awards, the club removes itself from the decision-making and therefore, responsibility for following rules established by each college and their foundations. Rules such as ensuring that we take Affirmative Action in making the awards,

that we don't over-award any single individual and other actions which might affect their financial aid. It takes what could be a 20-hour process for each committee member down to a single five-minute action by the Club's Board.

Scholarships are awarded by the respective community college in the spring term for the following fall quarter. Funds need to be delivered to the community colleges in Jan/ Feb for awards to be made.

HIGH SCHOOL GRANTS

In 2016 it was also decided that the Club should offer one \$500 grant to a high school automotive program in our region so they can purchase equipment and tools they need. The region encompasses NW Oregon and the Vancouver metro-area of Washington. In 2016 there were 18 schools eligible (using NW Oregon only.) In April 2016 a question arose about the ORPCA's boundaries. So for 2017 we have added schools in SW Washington and dropped some schools that do not offer automotive service programs or were out of the Region. At the October 2016

meeting it was decided that winners could not repeat two years in a row (although this has not been followed because we received so few applicants.)

In 2017 there are 20 high schools that offer auto mechanics in the Club's region. Also in 2017 the grant was increased to \$1,000 to each school. Each year the number of eligible high schools changes as more programs are found and some cease operation. The number has ranged from 18 to 23. Additionally there is usually significant turnover in faculty and principals at the schools with as many as 13 people changing a year.

High school grants are awarded by the Scholarship Committee in April for the following fall.

NOTE: Because of COVID-19 all K-12 schools in Oregon and Washington were only offering on-line education until spring quarter 2021. That was too late for the Club to award grants for 2021. Clackamas CC and Mt. Hood CC offered inperson instruction. Portland CC did not.

What is a Hashtag?

Tash tag: (on social media sites such as Instagram or Twitter) a word or phrase preceded by a hash or pound sign (#) and used to identify messages on a specific topic.

To filter through the clutter, hashtags can help marketers and advertisers track conversations among consumers.

For the average user on Instagram, hashtags can be used to join social movements, relate to certain cultures and topics, as well as to express themselves. Some popular cultural hashtags that come to mind are #tbt, or "Throwback Thursday," where people share old photos of themselves on Thursdays.

For the Porsche community, hashtags can be a fun way to show your enthusiasm for the cars we love! Here are some examples of Porsche specific hashtags:

#porsche, #porscheclub, #porsche911, #porschecayman, #porschelovers etc...

You can try to get really creative with these, but it's rare these days to find a Porsche hashtag that someone hasn't used before. It's also interesting to note that when you search for hashtags, the number of users is generally listed. Some have millions of users!

There are also more generic hashtags to find or create such as #sundayporschedrive or #porschesarethebestdontyouagree.

Database Management

It is estimated that this role would take about three hours per week. Training will be provided. Tasks include:



Weekly:

- Monitor automatic site backups
- Mirror complete site to staging area in alignment with "New Design" position
- Monitor from entry uploads, verify correctness and update the membership database as needed Monthly:
- Upload of PCA membership database
- Download of Stripe financial transactions database into an Excel database and correlate transactions with membership dues, event and refunds and verify correctness of data on the ORPCA member database
 - Download of website visitor data and update website visitor Excel spreadsheet
- Generate database exports into Excel for active members, new members, grace period members, lost members and member anniversaries
 - Upload Stripe, visitor and membership data to the Board of Directors area of the ORPCA website
- Generate the monthly webmaster report together with the other committee members and provide / present to the board

Yearly:

- Setup BoD (together with "New Pages" position) for the coming year and archive past years data In order to be successful in this role a person would need:
- Good understanding of Wordpress, import and export plug-ins, very basic php programming, good understanding of Excel (databases and formulas).

Design Update

This person is responsible for the design updates of the ORPCA website. This includes competitive analysis of other PCA club sites. A general knowledge of new design methodologies and trends is needed. It is estimated that this role would take about three hours per week, however, most of the time is concentrated around the year-end web site updates. Training will be provided Tasks include:
